At Mirimachi. Mr Territ Lister, 91, a native of Plymouth, E. He entered into the marine service at an early period of life, and was a pilot in the British Navy, on the Am. station. He was coxswain of the boat that landed Gen Wolfe, at the taking of Louisburg, in '58, and pilot of the Admiral's ship, when, in a dreadful storm, the fleet was driven from the siege of that town; and he conducted the only 7 out of 17 vessels that escaped the gale, into Whitehead harbor. He assisted Mr Hamilton Moore in his survey of the American coast; and attended Major Andre and Sir John Wentworth, when surveying the Gulph of St Lawrence, and the woods fitted for supplying masts for the navy.
